

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
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

In 2004, after completing six years, he opted to take a release from the Army. He started his civil life as a Deputy Manager at the Bank of Maharashtra. In 2006, he joined an MNC financial institution as an Assistant Manager and climbed up to the current position of Senior Vice President based in Malaysia.

Binu: Being a Fauji kid, I always had the advantage of meeting and connecting with people from different parts of India, which helped me understand diverse perspectives. Uday: Please give us details about what you are presently engaged in your professional role?

Binu: I am currently managing a team that is handling fraud investigations at a financial institution. This is a regional profile covering all the countries in Asia Pacific, and the position is based in Malaysia.

Uday: What was the impetus for you to leave the uniformed service?

Binu: I was very fortunate that my first exposure to work was in the Indian Army, where the activities are well defined and diverse. In a short period of time, it teaches you that "everything is possible; you just have to start". I was getting into my comfort zone, and I had to decide: should I stay and remain comfortable or explore outside of my comfort zone? This was a very difficult decision, as I had a family, but I eventually decided to step out.

Uday: Please tell us about your vision as you prepared for your second career after Army?

Binu: Honestly, I was not prepared for the world outside, as things are much different. But I soon realized that the first aim is to survive with whatever comes your way and then slowly explore what is around you to find out what is of interest. This journey from surviving to establishing yourself has to be planned, and the following will be helpful:

- The required skill set, training, and certification will help.
- Networking will be helpful; connect with people in your work area and also with peers in the industry.
- Be open to ideas, and don't be a wall and deflect things.
- We may not agree with everything, but aggression is not the answer.





Uday: What challenges you faced in this new journey? And, how did you overcome those challenges?

Binu: The first thing I noticed was that you cannot demand work but will have to extract it without being aggressive. This may sound a bit bizarre, but over a period of time I realized that by being aggressive, you are killing motivation, which is essential for a high-performing team. The easiest way to extract work is by teaching them and encouraging them to come up with ideas.

Uday: Would you like to share important learnings as you grew up in the corporate?

Binu: Learning should never stop; the world is changing at a rapid speed, and if you are not abreast of the latest in the industry, then you will become a dead wood. The other important thing is that we are all equally intelligent, so allow and encourage people to come up with ideas.

Uday: What is your team like, and how is it working in a place(a new country), full of different cultures and individuals from varied backgrounds?

Binu: I have a team of four (3 Chinese, 1 Malay, and 1 Filipino). It is very important to understand the lay of the land—their cultural practices, their beliefs, etc.—as their actions revolve around them. We should not be on a correction spree because they may not be wrong but are different.

Uday: How do you tackle the challenges, especially in today's competitive world?

Binu: Growth becomes a challenge after reaching a certain level in an organization, as the climb upwards is quite steep and you will have very limited positions. So, I am left with no choice but to come up with an improved version of myself, year after year.

Uday: What's the most important factor for any Forces Officer to settle down and succeed in any place outside India?

Binu: My suggestion is to be patient. Officers in forces are go-getters, but people outside are a bit raw for that. You will have to train and mold them to be go-getters. The other aspect would be clarity; everything may not be in black and white. You will have things that are in the gray zone, and do not hesitate to get clarity on them; asking or learning things will always be helpful.

Uday: How do you find your corporate journey so far?

Binu: Excellent and very satisfying experience. Change if necessary, amend if wrong, and always deliver the best for your client and organization. How can something like this not be exciting?

Uday: What are your future plans going forward?

Binu: I am planning for a bigger role, and I am open to working in any geography. So, the hunt is on.



Uday: There must have been great lessons during this tremendous journey. Can you share a few examples from your experience?

Binu: I have added those on top, but to summarize, be patient and don't be aggressive; be open to ideas; and keep that hunger for learning always alive.

Uday: So, what advice would you like to give to the fellow ForceNet members who want to take up similar corporate profile?

Binu: Prepare yourselves, as the world outside is very competitive. Officers from the forces have that extra dose of energy in them, so it is not going to be difficult. Please remember that your plan will have to be realistic; hold on to what comes your way first and then hunt for what you like.

Uday: Any important projects undertaken by you over these years?

Binu: Actually, there were a couple of them, but the best one was the setting up of the unit in Malaysia that I am currently heading. When I reached Malaysia, I did not even have a workstation for myself and my team. With that as a start, I rolled out the activity for 3 countries in 20 days, and in 3 months we supported 8 countries, and in 9 months all the Asia-Pacific countries.

Uday: How do you pursue hobbies or interests while there are commitments at work?

Binu: Honestly, I always had time, but my hobby is laying around.





JS Grewal

IN INTERACTION WITH IQBAL SINGH

Brig (Dr) JS Grewal, a third-generation army officer, was born in 1949. Alumni of King George's School and NDA were commissioned into GARH RIF in 1969. A veteran of the 1971 war, he commanded Fighting Fourth during Op Pawan, where he was wounded and awarded the Sena Medal for Gallantry. After commanding a brigade in the valley and in Punjab, he retired after a tenure as an instructor at the War College. After retiring and completing a PhD in defense and management, he taught MBA at various business schools for six years. He has written thirteen papers on military subjects and authored five books, of which three have been published in Germany. A permanent resident of the USA, he spends time in India as well.



IQ: Many congratulations on the publishing of your book "How to Connect with God." It is indeed a rare subject to write upon especially for a soldier. How did you decide to write this book and is there a backstory to this?

Jagtar: I was born into a religious family, so having imbedded spiritual and human values, I decided to spread knowledge gained over the years to all, irrespective of their religion, so that they could embark on a spiritual journey. In this Kalyug era, we find that people are selfish and engrossed in all sorts of activities, including exploiting religion for personal gains. This book has threefold aims as follows:

- For beginners, to suggest the easiest way to salvation and get a good body in the next birth.
- For those who have basic knowledge and believe in God to chalk out the road ahead.
- For those who think they are very knowledgeable but have not made any spiritual progress to show the correct path ahead instead of fruitless discussions.

IQ: I believe you have always been religious right from your NDA days and even before. You commanded 4 GARH RIF during Op PAWAN in Sri Lanka under some really challenging operational conditions?

Jagtar: Yes, I have been religious since childhood. A lot of officers think that in the NDA we do not get time for such activities, which is not correct. I used to get up at least one hour before others to say my prayers and visit Gurudwara Sahib every Saturday and Sunday, even at the cost of missing movies. Being religious makes a leader upright and have faith that God will hold his hand at all times. Subordinates also develop faith in him, provided he is truly religious and tolerant of all faiths.

After retirement, en route to Hemkund Sahib, I was accompanied by my co-brother, a retired officer as well. At Dehradun, where we spent a night, one of my teammates from OP PAWAN came to see us off. My co-brother expressed fear of rain and the problems that can be faced en route. My teammate told him nothing could go wrong because you were accompanying our ex-commanding officer. This kind of faith in a leader can only be experienced by those who think that nature will also cooperate. My brother turned religious after that trip.


Everyone wants to connect with God. Whether one is Agnostic or atheist, when in difficultly one tends to fall back on God for help. This book explains in a logical manner for a common person to connect with God irrespective of the religion they follow. This book serves the purpose of Three categories of persons, first are beginners who are inquisitive; second are those who have basic knowledge but require directions for final objective and third category of people who think they are knowledgeable but do not have divine knowledge. Part, one explains existence of God and propagates two religions theory. This part is common to all religions irrespective of their beliefs. The second part provides guidance to those who seek salvation. The path advocated is the easiest as advocated in Sikhism. Sikhism combines virtues of Indian and Abrahamic religions discarding their shortcomings. Logical explanations annotated with personal experiences will be easily understood by beginners who are inquisitive and by the knowledgeable who seek ultimate goals.

Maximum quotes are from Sri Guru Granth Sahibji (SGGS) because it contains the essence of all religious scriptures.

It is recommended that to drive maximum benefit from the book one must read Author's note and introduction chapter so that the essence can be grasped.

Brig (Dr) Jagtar Singh Grewal, SM is a retired Army officer of the Indian Army who has vast operational experience. After retirement having completed his PhD in Management he has been teaching management students in Various Business Schools He has deep knowledge about religions having interacted with spiritually advanced realized souls.

Also, he has personal experiences of divine visions since he is an ardent worshiper of God.



My recent publication

IQ: How did you think being spiritual helped you as a leader especially in battle? Jagtar: Being spiritual helps a leader in two ways, especially if he has achieved spiritual advancement. First, God's voice guides him. Another example is Brig Randhawa, who was later IG Mizoram. He said Sri Guru Gobind Singhji always guides him.

The second is that God automatically does all his work for those who love Him and His name (SGGS page 638). When subordinates have faith in him, battle progresses smoothly in their favor. He also puts across his views to his superiors in a straightforward manner without fear or becoming a yes man.



IQ: There is a famous story about you while in intensive operations in Sri Lanka you were doing your morning Prayer in the jungle and there was a call on the AN/PRC Radio set from the VCOAS in New Delhi. I believe you asked him to wait and he did. Tell us more about it?

Jagtar: Actually, while saying prayers, my sahayaks and radio operators never disturbed me, even if bullets were flying. This was one such incident. Such incidents have occurred many times in my life. Once, my Sahayak (we had Kumaon regt ERE) refused to let C Arty enter my room during war games at Srinagar.



Briefing the Chief

IQ: Tell us about your military career. What were the experiences that defined you and what were important life lessons that the military taught you?

Jagtar: Well, my career is jampacked with operational and other experiences. On commissioning, I joined 10 Garh Rif at Ramgarh. I was appointed as IO, moving straight into an exercise involving opposed river crossings, of which I had no experience. We moved to West Bengal on IS duties, thereafter trained Mukti Bhani, and then, for the war, were deployed in the Chamb Sector. Have experience of counterinsurgency in Mizoram, as BM of the brigade saw riots in Delhi in 1984, followed by OP Trident in Kashmir. Commanded 4 Garh Rif during OP PAWAN and in Punjab in counterterrorism operations. Brigade command at Thangdhar and at Jallandhar. Gained instructional experience at war college.

Some lessons that I learned are:

- Decision-making is a major task for a leader. He must have qualities like tolerance for ambiguity and a calculated risk profile without being foolhardy.
- Compassion, not pity for subordinates.



- Knowledge: From lower levels to the highest levels, tactics, operation art, and strategy. Before joining NDA, I had read all the basic books, including indirect strategy and Churchill's book on WWII. My first CO advised me to read one campaign and one biography every month, which I religiously did.
- The commander must be able to listen to criticism, too. During OP PAWAN, after a difficult operation, I quoted from a book on terrorism to our Brigade Commander, Brig Palsokar. He said he is not interested in reading about terrorism. I told him, Sir, how can you make that statement when you are dealing with terrorism? For a moment, I thought I had overstepped as he kept silent. But much later, when one of my company commanders, Maj. (later Lt Gen) Ata Hasnain, went for the SC course, he told him, "Tell your CO that I have caught up with my reading on terrorism." Such commanders are rare.
- In all situations, anger, emotions, etc. are okay in movies but not in reality. Ability to think clearly in all situations.
- Judging people is very important for finding the right person for the right job.
- Flexibility in approach and tenacity in aim.



Op Review with RM

IQ: Give us an idea about this book. What can a reader expect to gain by reading it? What is the message that you wish to convey via this book? Also in today's communally charged atmosphere what would be your message to people?

Jagtar: In this book, I have propagated two religions theories. One is Abrahamic, and the second is Indian. All others are offshoots of these; therefore, it is difficult to comprehend why they fight with each other except for greed, ego, and personal gains. If very few can also connect with God, the aim will be achieved. The book is in two parts. The first deals with connecting with God to lead a healthy life here and gain a good body in the next birth. The second deals with the journey to achieve spiritual goals, culminating in salvation. Language has been kept very simple, with a lot of illustrations of true incidents in a logical manner for an ordinary person to comprehend. After reading the book, if they give up differences based on rituals and live in harmony with each other, they will develop humility and lead a happy life. The objectives of the book will be achieved.



IQ: How did you conduct your research on this book? What were the major insights you gained from your research?

Jagtar: Research is an ongoing process. Going through various scriptures. Through the study of Sri Guru Granth Sahibji (SGGS), interaction with realized souls, and personal experiences, the book forms the basis.

Q: What is your writing process? Do you make a list of points, create a draft, and then refine it, or do you have long sittings to pen the book?


Jagtar: Yes, points have to be listed and then drafted. Every day, about two hours are optimum, as beyond that, serious work is difficult. Clarity of thought is a must. FM Montgomery is not liked by many for various reasons, but one thing I picked up from his autobiography is that when he started writing, he wrote without any cuttings. I have followed this principle throughout my life. Even as a BM, I used to write handwritten drafts like an assignment for staff college. Commander corrected it, and it went straight for typing for final copies.

IQ: You have also authored books in the past. Tell us about those books.

Jagtar: Three books published by Lap Academy in Germany are based on researchers' theses. while the book on meditation is a forerunner of the present work. Motivation: Theory of Prerna: Amalgamation of Eastern and Western Thought has been coauthored by Dr Jaspreet Ahluwalia and self.







IQ: Tell us about your family. How do they take it when you are busy writing, reading and researching your books?

Jagtar: My family fully supported me. Kiran Grewal, my wife, and Pavittar Singh, my son, helped me by giving administration support and leaving me free to work on the book. My elder son, Rupinder Singh Grewal, and our daughter-in-law helped with editing. Our granddaughter, Sulakhni Kaur Grewal (all three US citizens), edited the entire book and also wrote a foreword bringing out its relevance to the younger generation.

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





Types of Prompt Engineering

- **Creative Prompts:** This type of prompt encourages the AI model to generate creative outputs, such as writing a poem or composing music. **Prompt:** "Write a short poem about the ocean," and the AI model produces an original poem.
- Question-Answering Prompts: In this type, users ask questions to the AI model and expect informative responses. Prompt: "What is the capital of France?" and the AI model responds with "Paris."
- Debate Style: This type of prompt encourage AI to respond for and against a topic.
 Prompt: "Present arguments for and against the implementation of universal basic income"



Mein Hoon Bharatiya (मैं हूँ भारतीय)

About The Author:

Padam Shri Karingamannu Kuzhiyil Muhammed (born on July 1, 1952) better known as K. K. Muhammed, is an Indian archaeologist. He was the Regional Director (North) of the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI). After completing his education from Aligarh Muslim University, Muhammed served as Technical Assistant and then Assistant as Archaeologist in the department of History at Aligarh Muslim University. Muhammed was later selected as Deputy Superintendent Archaeologist Archaeological Survey of India. He was initially posted at Madras in 1988 and later transferred to Goa in 1991. In 1997, Muhammed was promoted as Superintendent Archaeologist and subsequently, served in Bihar, Uttar



Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh and Delhi. During this period, he also served as a tour guide to historic monuments for prominent foreign guests such as Pervez Musharraf and Barack Obama. In 2012, KK Muhammed retired as Regional Director (North) from Archaeological Survey of India.


To the World of Knowledge

KK Muhammed had grown up by watching his mother feeding the orphans in his early life. It may be the reason that KK Muhammed inculcated moral values by living simple life. KK Muhammed had started his studies at Madrassa (a muslim school, college, or university that teaches higher education in the Islamic religious studies) education at the age of 5. After a year, his friends had taken admission into the school but he was not admitted into school. He felt very lonely for not going to school but this loneliness inspired him to go to school. Muhammed's wish of joining school was told by his mother to his maternal uncle. One lie was also told to his maternal uncle that Muhammed education is to be arranged by his uncle as per directions given by his father. This lie had changed the life of Muhammed otherwise he would have been a Muslim priest.

The Big World of Reading

With his vision and experience, he concluded that libraries are centers of social reform in society. I also agree with him in this and can relate, as libraries and books have a deep impact on my personality too. He also raised several questions, like why moral





values are compromised by today's generation despite being imparted the best high-level education? Why is today's generation living in their realm and not being socially participatory? Why is today's generation insensitive to understanding the pain of others?

Sad Nostalgia

KK Muhammed had a lot of interest in history after securing the first position in Class 10th. His quest for learning had taken him to Aligarh University. He shares his early encounter with Prof. Irfan Habib (his history professor, who later became Chairman of the Indian Council of Historical Research) in class, where he expressed his independent views, which were taken in bad taste. KK Muhammed was made a victim of the professor's communist conspiracy for not obeying his ideology. Students who did not obey the orders of Prof. Irfan Habib were mentally tortured.

He was discriminated against and denied access to do research. A student whose marks were lower than his in B.A. and M.A. was offered a scholarship. He thanked Prof. Irfan Habib for denying him research work, due to which he got the opportunity to take a course in archeology.

Discovery of the Ibadat Khana and last days in Aligarh

After completing a diploma in Archaeology in 1978 from Delhi, KK Mohammed was appointed as an assistant archaeologist at Aligarh Muslim University (AMU). Ibadath Khana is a place called Din-e-Illahi in the Emperor Akbar era where he founded



human-made religion based on ethical values of all religions. The news of the discovery was published in national dailies like the Times of India and the Indian Express. An attempt was made by Prof. Habib to make KK Muhammed write a confession that the discovered place was not Ibadat Khana. A conspiracy was also hatched to showcase the Ibadat Khana discovery in the name of some other archaeologist. A documentary made about the discovery of Akbar's Ibadath Khana is available on YouTube.

KK Muhammed confessed that, from a historical perspective, places mentioned in history and mythology are in bad condition because the owner of the land is not ASI. These heritage sites are not fenced, and as a result, they become prey for encroachment by the land mafia. He found an innovative solution for stopping encroachment by inviting media persons, intellectuals, and teachers to participate in restoration activities. KK Muhammed also advocates the use of modern technology like cyberarchaeology, digital cultural heritage, third-generation graphic technology, and augmented reality systems to provide a better experience for tourists visiting historical places.

Kindness in approach

KK Muhammed worked in a Naxalite-hit area in Chhattisgarh. He encountered Naxals, and he was asked to stop working. In order to start work, Naxalites asked for donations. The donation amount was small, so KK Muhammed hesitantly agreed to give in exchange for the restoration of temples. With this experience, he came to the conclusion that no matter how bad people are, you can change their thinking and behaviour with your good behaviour.

Bateshwar is asking, who is the Dacoit?

Bateshwar, Morena, has a complex of 200 ancient Shiva and Vishnu temples situated 40 km away from Gwalior. Bateshwar was a miniature of the Ankorvat temple in Cambodia. The area was under the control of Nirbhay Singh Gujjar and Gadariya Dacoits. KK Muhammed was successful in convincing the dacoits to let him restore these temples. He was able to restore 60 temples during his tenure in the region. After the dacoits were eliminated by the police, the area was encroached upon by the mining mafia. KK Muhammed had written a letter to RSS Chief K Sudarshan to intervene in this sensitive matter. K. Sudharshan came to Bateshwar in the next 24 hours, followed by police action against the local mining mafia. There is also a documentary made on "The Rebirth of a Forgotten Temple Complex in Bateshwar," which is available on YouTube.

That moment will be never be called

Labourers from different parts of India work on restoration work for ASI. These labourers children begged when their parents left for work. Due to the change of workplace for labourers, these children do not get the opportunity to study. After seeing miserable plight of these children, he asked himself a question: "Is children's



liberation not our social commitment?" He started a makeshift school inside monuments. Not a single penny was taken from the government to run this school. The responsibility of running the school was given to his wife, Rabiya, and other friends. KK Muhammed also received the 'Citizen Journalist Award' for this social work.

PART-2

Experience Lesson

The basis of the cultural identity of every person is his own heritage. KK Muhammed expressed his strong views on religion and terrorism in an open manner:

- A Muslim who is not ready to accept Ram and Krishna as the patriarchs of his culture in the name of religion cannot become an Indian in the true sense. Similarly, even a Hindu who does not believe in Qutubuddin Aibak and Akbar cannot become a true Indian.
- Today's history is being studied from a communal point of view, which is wrong.
- The Muslim rulers made many mistakes in the medieval period. Muslims must be ready to accept these mistakes, and Hindus must forgive them. By doing this, the path of nation-building will be smooth.
- At present, the Muslims of India wander like souls, carrying the burden of the sins committed by their forefathers on their shoulders. They do not want to accept the mistakes; rather, they try to reduce the sense of sin from the principles derived from Marxists economic point of view.

Government Employee and Media

Government employees should have good relations with the mediums who work as the fourth pillar of democracy. In government service, KK Mohammed always got the active support of the media. His social life started with book reading. I also believe that reading books opens up the windows and doors of the mind. I developed the habit of questioning through books, and to this day, books are my best friends.

Ayodhya: Some Historical Facts

KK Muhammed was one of the members of the Ayodhya excavation team under the leadership of Professor B.B. Lal. The following historical facts were narrated by KK Muhammed as part of the excavation team:

- When he reached there for the excavation, there were temple pillars on the walls of the Babri Masjid.
- In the lower part of the pillar, full urns were made, as seen in the 11th-12th century temples. Full urns are one of the eight Aishwarya symbols in the temple art.
- The same type of pillar and the brick plinth under it were obtained from the construction of the sides and rear of the mosque, as was earlier told about the pillar made of stone.

Based on this evidence, KK Muhammed said that there was a temple under the Babri Masjid. His statement came on 15th December, 1990.



Become 'Vishav Guru'

Knowledge of one's heritage is very important for the development of new ideas and for increasing self-confidence in any society. Due to its rich cultural heritage, India was sitting at the helm of Vishva Guru. We can take the nation to new heights by making a new generation aware of our culturally influential heritage. It is sad that no government has tried to convert our historical monuments into sources of our cultural consciousness.

Summary

After reading this book, it dawned on me that had I not joined the armed forces, I would have been an archaeologist. This book is an honest depiction of KK Muhammed's life while fighting with the system without any compromise in his work ethics. He is a role model of chivalry and transformational leadership. He stood for the truth and lived his life with great valour. Every person entering public service should draw inspiration from the ethical values displayed in his professional career. He never hesitated to select tough assignments due to his ability to anchor his decisions. I will correlate Padam Shri KK Muhammed with our former President of India and Missile Man Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam with the concepts of simple living and high thinking.

Recommendation And Rating

The book is a must-read for every Indian as it depicts the values and ethos displayed by a common man called KK Muhammed. His kind and straightforward approach to life makes bumpy journeys look smooth. My rating for this book is 5 stars.
