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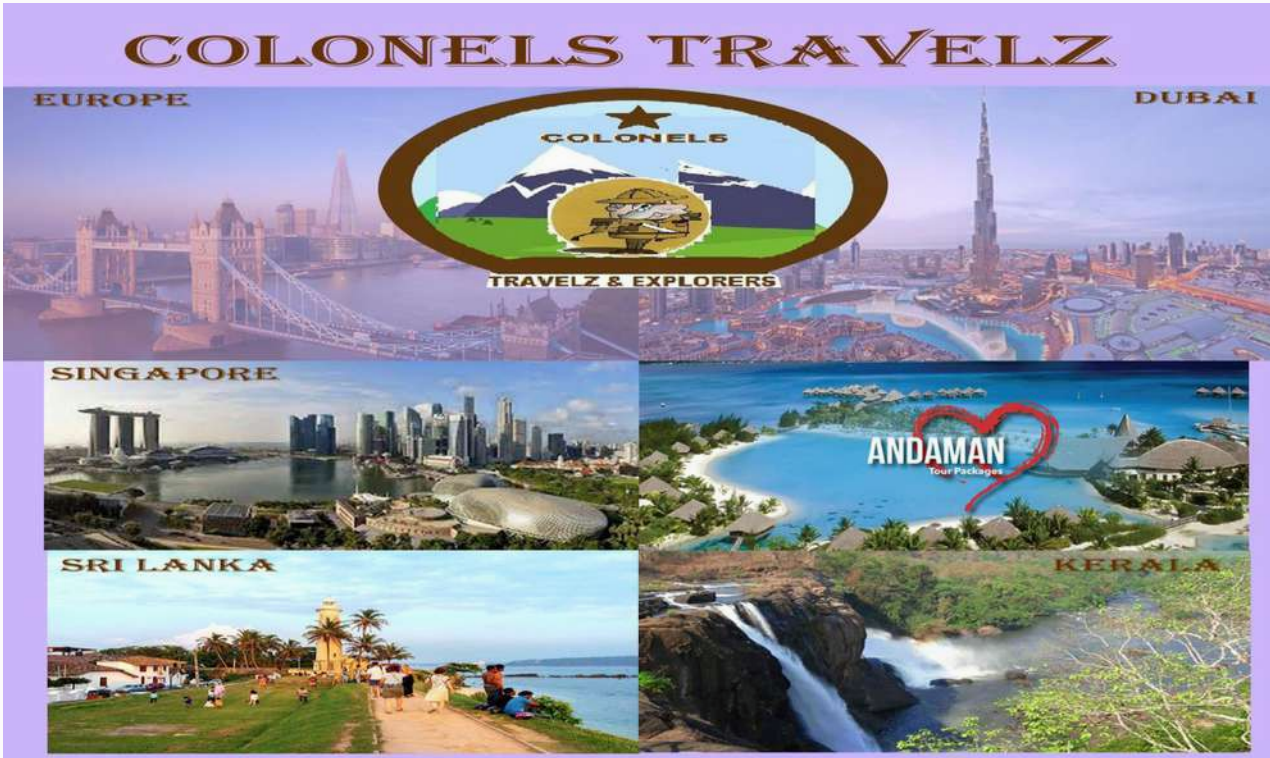

## **IN INTERACTION WITH IQBAL SINGH**

**Lt Col Anjan Kumar Mukhopadhyay** was commissioned into Corps of Signals in Dec'87. He is a graduate of NDA, 71st Course, post graduation in field of AI ML from IIT Kharagpur in 2003. In the Army he has served in all types of major Signal regiments and with a EW unit in CI Ops. Post his PMR in Oct 2008, he has been working in telecom Managed Services practice area with Alcatel-Lucent and Ericsson. He has the distinction of heading the largest Global Network Operations Centre of Ericsson, managing and automating mobile networks of major telecom operators from across the globe. Currently, he is part of the Pre-Sales team of Ericsson, developing cutting edge solutions for management of 5G networks and Enterprise Private 5G networks.



**IQ: Please tell us something about your background prior to joining the Army, and your subsequent Army career?**

**Anjan:** At the outset would like to thank Col Iqbal for honouring me with this interview, though personally feel I am nowhere as star-worthy as those who have featured in this magazine earlier!

Coming to the question proper, the highlight of my childhood was the frequent transfers of my father, an Air Force officer. I studied in 9 different schools in all compass directions of India. The upside of these frequent re-location was my developing some sort of resilience to culture shocks associated with changes in schools. This possibly held me in good stead when I stepped out of uniform in late 2008.

In the Orwellian year of 1984, Jan, I joined NDA, transforming overnight from a teenager student to a Cadet. A life changing transformation that was to define thereafter whatever I have done in my life till date.

On commissioning into Corps of Signals in 1987, I had the opportunity in serving in nearly all types of Signal Regiments including in an EW unit at peak of insurgency. In 2001, I was nominated for MTech in IIT Kharagpur, majoring in the field of AI ML.

I rounded off my satisfying Army career as Director Automation in DG Signals, Army Headquarters. In this role I got an unique opportunity to design, plan and execute IT projects for automation of military academies in 3 'friendly' foreign countries in Asia and Africa. These projects were a military diplomacy initiative of the then COAS, Gen JJ Singh. It was a lifetime experience gained to negotiate the bureaucratic labyrinth in South and North block ministries and successfully execute these projects overseas.

These experiences in Army got me 'ready' for the second innings in civil !!

**IQ: Give us an understanding about your current role and what you are presently engaged in?**

**Anjan:** My career in corporate has been in the area of Mobile Networks Managed Services Operations. It involves end-to-end technical management of mobile networks of Telcos like Airtel, Vodafone. The mobile operators by outsourcing the network management are thereby free to focus all their energies on business offering to mobile customers. This reduces Opex and improves efficiencies of telco operators without them bothering about increasing technological complexities of the networks.

Ericsson is currently a world leader in Managed Services with its globally renowned best practices and state of the art automation tools suite based on AI ML. I am working with Ericsson for 12 years now in many operational leadership roles, viz, Quality & Audit management, Network Operations Centre(NOC) Delivery, automation and transformation. High point in these roles has been my four years as the Head of Global NOCs servicing multiple leading global telcos of different countries across geographies and time zones ranging from APAC to Latin America.

Last year I decided to change gear and moved to Pre-Sales Solutions team within Ericsson. In this team I am responsible to design network services and pricing for new mobile networks being outsourced to Ericsson, mainly 5G and Private 5G networks. This role is thus giving me a ring-side view of the latest networks and automations being architected for global leading telecom operators.

**IQ: How did you prepare yourself for the Military to Corporate transition?**

**Anjan:** My time spent in IIT Kharagpur was indeed transformative. The entrepreneurial enthusiasm of young civilian students sparked an intense desire in me to explore the civilian world.

Looking back, I feel that besides the strong urge to step into civil life, I didn't really 'prepare' in the classical sense. It was basically a leap of faith, the outcome of the following equation:

**Insatiable desire to explore other career option + loads of self-confidence + an attitude of gratitude + willingness to unlearn + willingness to learn + lots of luck = Leap of Faith !!!**

*Was this a correct path?* Well at that time there was no Forces Network group to bounce thoughts or seek mentorship. I did exchange notes regularly with Col Iqbal and other course-mates like Cols Sandesh, Niroop, Mitra, Dhingra and Col Asthana who were also determined to make a mark out in civil. So in a sense we were a band of brothers with a common aim. Some of them did make very good preparations like taking up additional certifications and MBA degree.

My postgraduate degree from IIT and the then booming telecom sector did add to my confidence, that getting a job would not be a challenge. Hence I also decided not to take additional certifications like PMP. In hindsight, it was a risky decision. But all's well that ends well.

**IQ: What were the challenges faced during your Transition? How did you overcome the challenges?**

**Anjan:** Well, even before the ink in my PMR order of MS branch could dry, there was a Black Swan event. The subprime mortgage crisis led by M/S Lehman Brothers stock crash put the global economy into a massive panic. Rumors of global financial meltdown meant that all IT and Telco companies in India went into a shell and withheld all hirings for many months. I remember those days daily walking up and down the hiring agencies in Delhi, Noida, Gurgaon with CV in hand searching for any opening. My Sigs MS even suggested me to withdraw my PMR and showed me a DO letter written by an officer bitterly regretting his choice of taking PMR. Well I didn't take the bait and held on to my firm belief that step in right direction had been taken.

Luck smiled some months after my PMR, when Col Dhingra, who had already got a job, referred me for the opening of Training Manager in ALUMS, a subsidiary of Alcatel-Lucent which was in joint venture with Reliance Communications in Navi Mumbai. It wasn't the profile or the location that I wanted. But it was in the industry I desired. I took the role and glad that the decision turned out to be correct.

ALUMS being a new and growing organisation, the energy was high and positive with lot new unstructured work. To make my visibility, I volunteered to take on many additional responsibilities and made positive contributions. This was well appreciated by the management resulting in two promotions within a year of joining them. The extensive work and learnings in ALUMS greatly helped when I moved after two years to Ericsson.

**IQ: Though you are a Signals officer now working in a telecom company. Do you think the transition to a technology role is much tougher than say a non-tech role? If so, why? How can one mitigate that?**

**Anjan:** Though I was a Signals Officer, managing 2G mobile networks was still new to me. I had to make efforts to learn about the technology and processes. In later years as the technology evolved quickly from 2G to 5G, I had to spend considerable personal time on upgrading my knowledge so as to be an effective team leader. Its true that my basic technical background of Signals did help in assimilating the practical nuances of new technologies faster.

For a non-technical officer entering technical domain, a basic overview of IT and mobile technology, with certifications, could help in entering the tech space. But the ability to move from theoretical to practical implementation of knowledge would obviously be the key to success on the job.

My course-mate, Col Nirop Chandran, an AD officer, is a great example of a typical non-techie joining the telco industry in a techno-managerial role. And for a decade he has been in Ericsson delivering exceptional performances over these years. He would be able to give insights about his path to success.

With this era of No-Code or Low-Code and ChatGPT, the 'need' for technical background is getting blurred. The 'hot' areas of Cloud, Data Analytics and InfoSec don't really require technical background to become experts in these domains. Ability to understand technical aspect and put it into business use is the key - not the background qualification.

**IQ: While many veterans jumped on to the then booming telecom bandwagon in the period of 2007-2010, in the long run many did not survive for long. You are amongst the so few that have thrived in the industry for nearly a decade and a half. What do you think the others did NOT do right?**

**Anjan:** After Lehman brother scam, another black swan event of the 2G scam in 2009 took its toll with multiple Indian mobile telcos going belly up, vaporising big chunk of job opportunities in telecom sector. This affected many of our veterans for reasons beyond their control. It was just a case of bad luck of being present at a wrong place. As the recent episodes of mass layoffs in tech companies reveal that the businesses just don't care for the contribution, qualifications or ability of an employee before laying him/her off.

Personally, for me I suppose it was just a matter of chance and pure luck that I got new opportunities in time suitable. And I am equally fortunate that the hiring managers found me fit for the roles in their teams, despite my higher age bracket.

**IQ: How important is it to understand your own passion and expertise and then to work towards upskilling in that domain so as to have a Better Outing in corporate? How does one identify one's passion?**

**Anjan:** Identifying passion is a difficult but important question. Alignment of passion with interests and skills can certainly increase job satisfaction and lead to better outcomes in their civilian careers.

I guess personal reflection and help of a mentor would be a good approach to identify one's passion. Forces Network is a good source of some high achievers who can be requested for mentoring.

**IQ: You have had a long stint in the corporate. To be successful what traits from the military must we give up and what must we imbibe?**

**Anjan:** Military life imbibes in us skills which are also transferable skills, which help us to blend with the corporate culture - if done correctly. Yes, the regimented command & control type of managerial approach may be out of place. But a collaborative and Servant Leadership type of approach would be effective.

Most big companies work on extensive matrix ways of working to deliver products. Given the likely age gap between the veteran and the civilian colleagues a mature, humble approach would be required, shedding aside some of the rigid thought process and some ego.

***We must leverage on these skills that the veterans are most sought for:***

- Change management skills
- Fact based decision making skills
- Planned execution skills
- Good Communication & presentation skills
- Demonstrating empathy, something we all learn in regimentation
- Resilient and never give up approach to a problem
- Think globally and act locally
- Agile mindset

**IQ: What message would you like to give to transitioning military officers who wish to make a career in the technology industry?**

**Anjan:** Some thoughts that immediately come to my mind are:

- There is no sure-shot template or PCK which can be replicated.
- Luck plays an important role. But luck is effective if and only if one has a good social 'network'.
- Quality of your Network would define your starting baseline net-worth.
- Know yourself, know the current business trends and know the technological evolution trend - a diligent skill gap analysis.

- Try to acquire a T-shaped competency. Digitisation, virtualisation of all things physical, softwarization and cloudification, is leading to a flatter tech organisations. This means that mid-level managers would soon be extinct. Hence, a T-shaped competency would enable a veteran to fit faster and better in the organisation's value chain.

Given the dynamic business challenges today, I personally strongly feel that an MBA qualification from good institute would be very essential body armour. The benefit I see is that MBA can make the veteran suitable for multiple types of tech industry, including the burgeoning startups.

**IQ: Tell us about your family and the role played by them in your successful Transition?**

**Anjan:** The positive aspect was that my wife, Malavika, was also bitten by the bug to explore the civil world and this made my decision to leave easier. So, without a house to settle down and one child in school and another in pre-school, we took the leap into the known unknown.

The transformation journey has been spectacular for Malavika. With lots of determination, grit and grime she has successfully transitioned from a primary school teacher to now leading PAN India Marketing & Operations teams for premier brand in Retail sector.

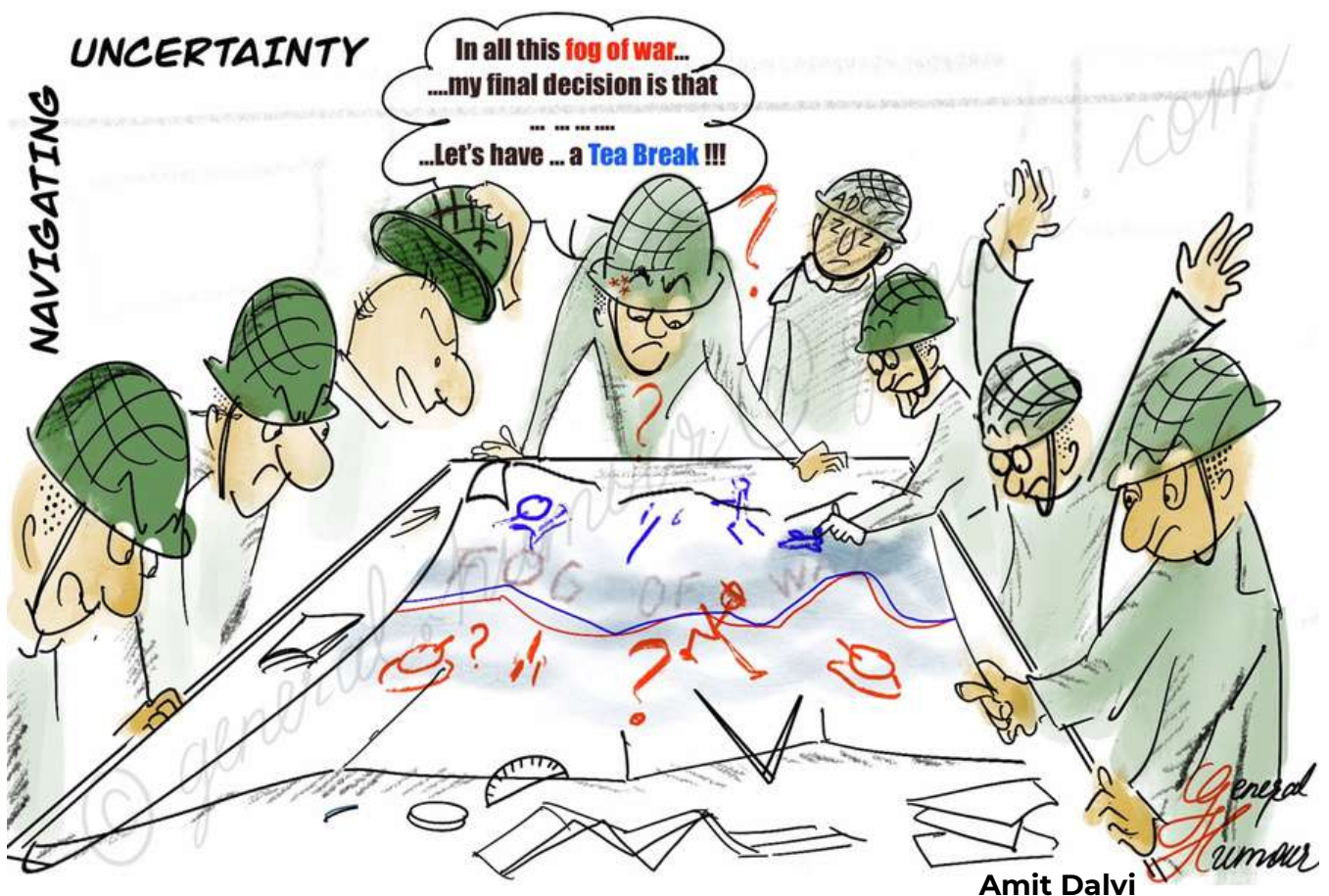

## IN INTERACTION WITH UDAY SHRIWAS

**Sqn Ldr Rajat Kaura post his schooling in Delhi, joined the 72nd course NDA. Commissioned as a helicopter pilot and flew primarily Mi-8 and Mi-35 helicopters, he had a tenure at NDA, did staff course and commanded a missile sqn. He took premature retirement after 15 years of service. Moved to Sydney thereafter and flew for CareFlight as a MedEvac pilot for about 7 years in Sydney. Flew Airbus 120 helicopter as a pilot with Ghodawat Industries in India for about 8 years. Currently with QANTAS as an Instructor.**



**Uday:** Please tell us something about your background prior to joining the IAF, and your subsequent Air Force career?

**Rajat:** I came from a civilian background. One of my cousins, an Ex-NDA, inspired me to join NDA and become a pilot. I joined the 72nd NDA course and got commissioned as a helicopter pilot in June '88. I mainly flew the Mi-8s and the Mi-35s. I had a tenure as an instructor at NDA and I also did the Staff Course. My last assignment was as the CO of a Missile Unit. I opted for premature retirement after about 15 years. I then moved to Sydney with family.

**Uday: Please give us details about what you are presently engaged in your professional role and where are you based out of?**

**Rajat:** I have been working as a Helicopter Pilot for most of my life after the IAF. I joined QANTAS as an Aviation Instructor in May 2022. Earlier, I was flying for CareFlight, in Australia, as a MedEvac Helicopter Pilot.

**Uday: Considering you were a permanent commissioned officer what was the impetus for you to leave the uniformed service so early in your military career?**

**Rajat:** I was looking for good education for my son, as he stood first in the state. Having served at bases like Suratgarh and Pathankot, I could not promise him the best education. Also, as a family, we were looking for a good Civilian lifestyle. It was a difficult and well deliberated family decision to hang the uniform.

**Uday: Please tell us as to why did you decide to move out of India? And Why Australia? Also how did all of it happened so fast?**

**Rajat:** Australia is a multi-cultural country that welcomes all cultures across the world. Some of the advantages we saw are good education, employment opportunities, quality of life, security, healthcare and openness. Compared to a few other countries that we were contemplating; Australia ticked ALL the boxes for us. Based on her qualifications, my wife was the principle applicant and then things happened very fast and they accepted our application.

**Uday: Would you like to share important learnings as you grew up in the world outside after getting released from the Armed Forces? What are the differences in the work culture in India Vs Australia?**

**Rajat:** My transition was directly from the IAF to corporate world in Sydney. The work culture in Australia is a bit different from the rest of the world. The office hierarchy is much relaxed, and all employees are treated with respect and at par with each other. There is a strong emphasis on the team, rather than a high-ranking individual. Australian work culture is characterized by high union membership numbers and a federally driven, but state controlled, mandatory arbitration and conciliation system.

**Uday: What are the challenges in immigrating to another country and starting all over again? How did you overcome them? Any advice to others?**

**Rajat:** Having lived in India for all my life, I was in my comfort zone there. Moving to Australia meant understand their way of life and their accent - which I understand is one of the most difficult to pick with about a billion slangs. I had to work my way up and get all the necessary Australian qualifications as a pilot. As an advice to those seeking to settle down here, I would suggest that you try to get all the qualifications needed for your job while you are planning to move, so that once you are here, you can get employed faster.

Some of the challenges that I had to face are the cost of living (till I started a decent job), finding suitable employment, language and communication barriers, and as a pilot, learning to fly a new role, a new helicopter, new Geography, getting adjusted to a new work environment and culture.

As for the family, the education system is a lot different - with more emphasis on self-studies, rather than spoon feeding; and the social interaction is also very different. Lack of domestic help meant a lot more responsibilities for the whole family.

**Uday:** You have been in Flying Career for a Long Time, and also in different Countries, what has been your experience as you lookback to your journey? Any anecdotes, memorable moments, Specific Challenges.. If you could please share?

**Rajat:** I have flown in 5 countries, spanning 3 continents. It has been fun and challenging to say the least. Flying as a Commercial Helicopter Pilot was obviously more relaxed and had a different set of challenges. In India, I had the opportunity to fly for some Bollywood and regional movies. Was fun interacting with the crew and gave me an insight to the industry.

**Dr.(CA) Aseema Dake Kulkarni** is a Chartered Accountant. She completed her doctoral studies in investment planning with specific emphasis on use of technology for stock market investments. One of her research papers on use of blockchain technology was selected for presentation at the international conference held at IIM Raipur. She is a visiting faculty member at leading B-Schools and conducts workshops and seminars for them and corporates on Finance. Aseema has worked in corporates like Ernst and Young and Goldman Sachs. She has her own venture 'Krishna Professional Coaching' for guiding CA aspirants. An ardent devotee of Lord Krishna, she strongly believes in Karma-Yoga.



### **Uday: Please tell us about yourself and what you do?**

I am a Chartered Accountant , having completed doctoral studies in the area of investment planning with specific emphasis on use of predictive analytics in the Indian stock market. I have also completed my Masters in Computer Management, Diploma in Information System Audit (ICAI) and a certification in IFRS from IACT Global. In the CA exams have been an All India Rank Holder for PE-1 14th Rank all over India and 49th Rank all over India.

In the initial part of my career, I have worked with firms like Ernst and Young and Goldman Sachs. After a short stint in corporate I moved into the field of academics. I have worked with various management institutions like SIBM - Bangalore, Indira Institute of Management, IMED Bharati Vidyapeeth, D Y Patil's Institute of Management and Research and Kirloskar Institute of Advanced Management Studies.

In 2019 , I opted to be a freelancer. Today I teach at various universities and colleges as a visiting faculty member. **Uday: What is it that inspired you to embark on the journey of imparting Knowledge in the field of Finance?**

**Aseema:** ‘The more you teach , the more you master the concept’. This was something I had experienced in my college days as well. As I was pursuing a professional course like CA , I used to help my friends with accounting and finance related concepts. I used to love explaining any new concept learnt. Even when i took up a corporate job I knew that someday I would like to get into the field of academia.

Academia is an area where you can do multiple things at the same time. This is something which pulled me towards it. In this field one can teach, one can conduct research on the topic of one’s interest, get involved in industry collaborations and

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**Uday: Being a Teacher you must be witnessing vast changes in the field of education, what are your thoughts?**

**Aseema:** I mostly teach in the space of higher education to students who pursue professional courses. We use Andragogy as a teaching methodology which means the understanding of the science and practice of adult learning. Higher education has undergone huge changes since I started teaching in 2010. Also the businesses are trying to survive and thrive in a VUCA world (Acronym used for volatility , uncertainty , complexity and ambiguity). Today a set of business ideas may not remain relevant within a short time span due to changing complexities. Artificial intelligence is already changing the business landscape. For their skill sets to remain relevant students have to upgrade themselves on a regular basis.

Students have access to all sorts of lectures on the internet. They can learn from professors in India and abroad sitting in the comfort of their homes. Earlier there used to be a very pre-defined content and exam patterns were also rigid. Today a student can be evaluated on various parameters. More than just case studies , a student gets to work on real life data especially in subjects involving stocks and other financial instruments. A student's progress is tracked through advanced learning management systems which have changed the way course work is delivered. Online proctored exams , open book exams , plagiarism checks , tie - ups with industries for experiential learning , exposure to student exchange programmes are few examples of the way teaching is evolving.

Education space is changing for the better and the new generation would surely benefit from it. On a lighter note , we are even attending seminars to help us formulate assessments which cannot be answered by chatbots like ChatGPT.

**Uday: Could you please tell us more about the research you carried out in your field?**

**Aseema:** My research is in the area of stock market investment with the help of technology. Many retail investors do not have access to sophisticated trading algorithms. Weka is a collection of machine learning algorithms for data mining tasks. It contains tools for data preparation, classification, regression, clustering, association rules mining, and visualization. My initial phase of research used this tool on stock market related data to find patterns for future predictions.

Use of various technologies have changed the way the stock market functions. From the outcry mechanism to algorithmic trading , technology has played a very important role in stock market data. My research area involves continuously studying new technologies and assessing their impact on the stock market. Few papers written by me include impact of blockchain technology on the stock market , regulations regarding high frequency trading which takes place in the stock market. Would continue to work in the same area for research in future as well.

**Uday: Any other challenges you faced so far on the way to establishing yourself and how you challenged those challenges?**

**Aseema:** Challenges are meant to teach you something. Either we look at them as roadblocks or opportunities to do something better. When faced with a challenge , I have treated it as god’s plan for something better for me. When God closes one door he opens another for sure. Spirituality is something that has kept me strong and helped me to cope up with both personal and professional challenges. The biggest challenge was an eight year battle with writer’s cramp during my college days. But it also made me more humble and compassionate towards others.

Another notable challenge is to find a work - life fit. I would call myself fortunate to work as a free lancer which helps me take care of the family aspect. But yes , it is challenging to multi task and I sometimes wonder how the week was managed with a nuclear family set-up.

**Uday: Live in the present moment and/or Plan for the future? What’s your mantra?**

**Aseema:** To be honest , both. Balancing both would be a more pragmatic approach rather than choosing one. The good old story of the grasshopper and the ant teaches us to work in the current situation with an eye on the future.

**Uday: What advice do you have, especially for family members (wives) from Fauj? Would you like to mention about the Family support you received on this journey?**

**Aseema:** "Two roads diverged in a wood, and I—  
I took the one less traveled by,  
And that has made all the difference."

A poem by Robert Frost that I still remember. Sometimes we deter to work in unknown terrains as the chances of failure are high. But working in unexplored areas gives immense satisfaction. Not being swayed by others opinion and trusting one's own judgement is the best gift one can give to oneself.

Prashant is the my strongest supporter who does not believe that women are any different when it comes to professional world. It is immense respect about my work from his end that motivates me to do better each day. With out family support this journey would not have been possible. I have missed a lot of family functions , events , festivals for progressing in my professional life. He has supported me in every decision.

**Uday: As an aspiring and confident woman in the World of academia, How's your experience? 5 Leadership Qualities that Women bring on The table?**

**Aseema:** By god's grace I work in the area I like. Prashant tells jokingly to his friends that she 'likes to study'. Being an avid reader, my professional life allows me to explore new topics and read about the same on a very regular basis.

I would vouch for sincerity, dedication, integrity, honesty and resilience being in the armour of every professional woman. Also, though I have not surveyed or researched this part, I feel women would score higher on emotional intelligence which would help them in leadership roles.

**Uday: Most importantly, What is the best thing you love about your Domain of studies and research ?**

**Aseema:** My research area revolves around technological impacts on the stock market. Today we live in a world where many major decisions are being taken by a bot, the fact that our 'destination is on the right' is told to us by an app and speech recognition is making my study notes. Fin-Tech is something that has changed the way we manage our finances. UPI enabled payments have allowed us to keep our physical wallets in the cupboard. Working in an area that is impacting the way we trade in the stock market is truly one of the best chosen field of work for someone like me who has pursued interdisciplinary studies involving finance and technology both.

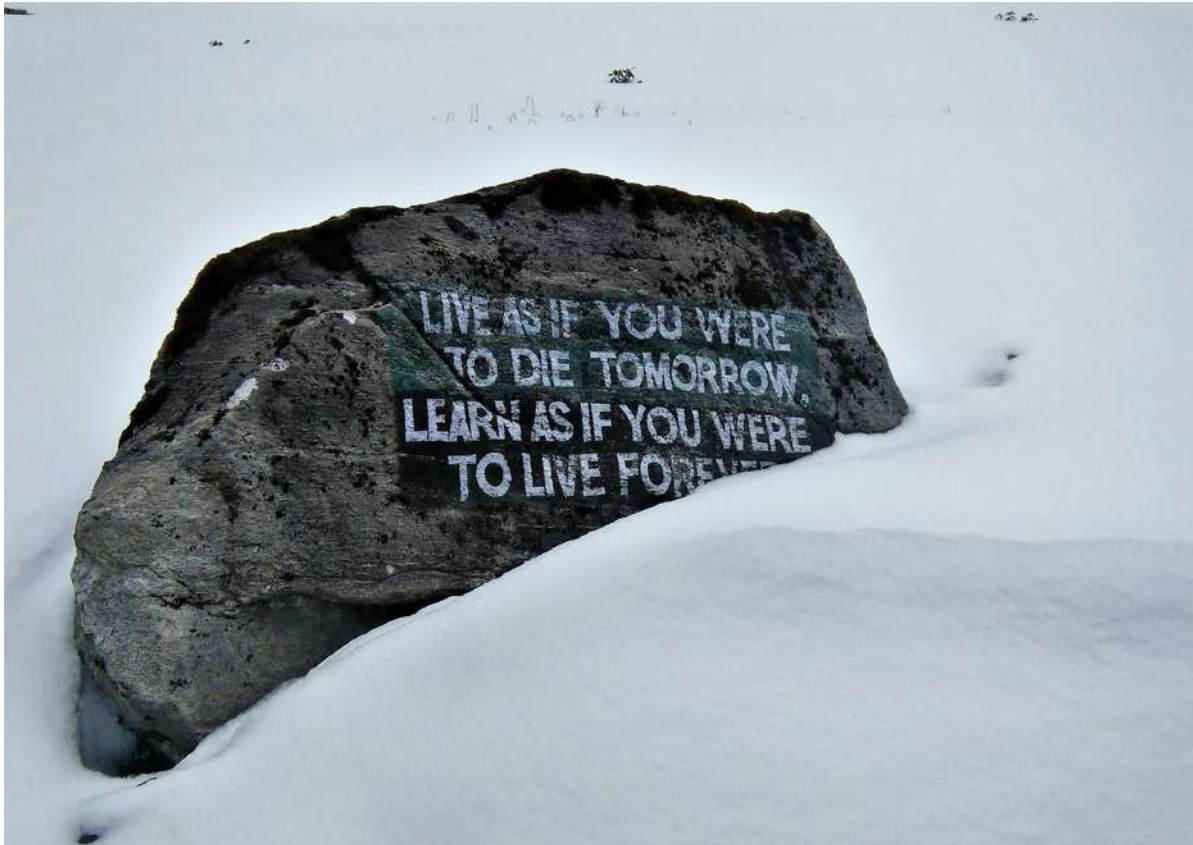
### **Uday: What inspired you to start writing?**

**Rajat:** I had not been a writer from the start. My journey started with this vague inspiration of writing stories around the thousands of travel photos which otherwise only kept moving from one storage device to another. It is when my uncle (who is an expert photographer) prompted me to document these pictures that I decided to write. Initially, it started with a diary, until I came across blogging in 2012.

The travel blogging industry was very new then, and I decided to take a shot. In Nov 2012, The Trawellblogger was born. I got my first break in 2015 to write for the Holiday IQ Campaign and since then, there was no looking back. In 2020, after the pandemic struck and the leisure travel was stalled, I had to bid my blog a good bye, but I continue to document my stories through my travel ebooks.

### **Uday: What inspired you to write Arunachal Diaries?**

**Rajat:** The one reason I chose to write about Arunachal Pradesh is that it still remains an underrated destination. As an Armed Forces fraternity, we are fortunate to have served here and such places have huge potential for expanding the tourism industry. It also allows the common people to know and connect with the Armed Forces profession up close and learn about the real-life challenges (and adventures) of our profession.

**Uday: What is a travel memoir and how did you come across this style of writing?**

**Rajat:** A memoir is usually used in the context of history or biography. I used the term memoir here to recollect and write the stories from the pictures I have gathered along my past journeys. In travel memoirs, you use extended narratives of a picture, with detailed expressions and thoughts about a place, people, culture etc.

Travel memoir is a genre in itself in the non-fiction category. In a Fauji way, I would say that it is like the picture perception test, where we used to write a story on a picture shown to us, except that the story is far more detailed. It is like a “live broadcast” through your words. So now that you know the trick, you do not have an excuse to not write.

**Uday: How do you gather ideas for writing a book?**

**Rajat:** Keeping a journal helps. The ideas have a habit of coming to your mind when you do not have an option to note them down. Hence, they tend to often slip away with time. While traveling to a place, I take some time to note down my thoughts about the place which I can articulate later on in details. The instinctive or subconscious ideas are powerful and a journal comes handy to note them down as and when they come. The key is, you must make sure you note them right away, so that you register the most authentic and raw ideas on time.

**Uday: Is it possible for anyone to write?**

**Rajat:** *“But how could you live and have no story to tell?”* - Fyodor Dostoevsky's White Nights (1848).

This quote is so simple yet so profound. Everyone has a story. It's just that no one is good about how to start. Storytelling like anything else is more about practice than talent. I never started out as the best writer on the first day. The goal was to write and express and not to be the best. I take this too as a journey.

There are no good or bad writers, rather there are ones who write and the ones who don't. What worth is a story if not written at all. It goes to the grave alone. If you can read and write, do yourself a favour; write about yourself. It will help you to create the most authentic version of yourself. Give your authentic self a chance to emerge.

**Uday: What are the barriers or blocks you face while writing and how do you cope with them?**

**Rajat:** Creative writing is all about creating the experience. The reader is literally 'walking' the experience through your words. When they read, they create impressions in their mind on the go. As a writer, developing that skill took time and effort. It is not as much about what you can see in the picture as much it is about what's unseen, that keeps the intrigue alive.



The “writer’s block” is another challenge for me and I am sure it is for any other writer. This also leads to procrastination as the ‘flow’ is disturbed. I usually try to write in the early mornings when the mind is empty. Also, as I said earlier, I keep notes of the ideas that come along the entire day. That gives me a reference point and helps me to restart the flow of thoughts and ideas quickly.

**Uday: Have you ever thought of writing in other categories/ genre yet?**

**Rajat:** During the lockdown, I realized that I can work on writing in other domains as well. I have an inclination on topics such as business, entrepreneurship and self-development and would write on the same as well. As a matter of fact, there is already a project in pipeline. Also, I am more comfortable writing in Hindi, one of the reasons I published the Hindi version of Arunachal Diaries as an experiment to see the acceptance.

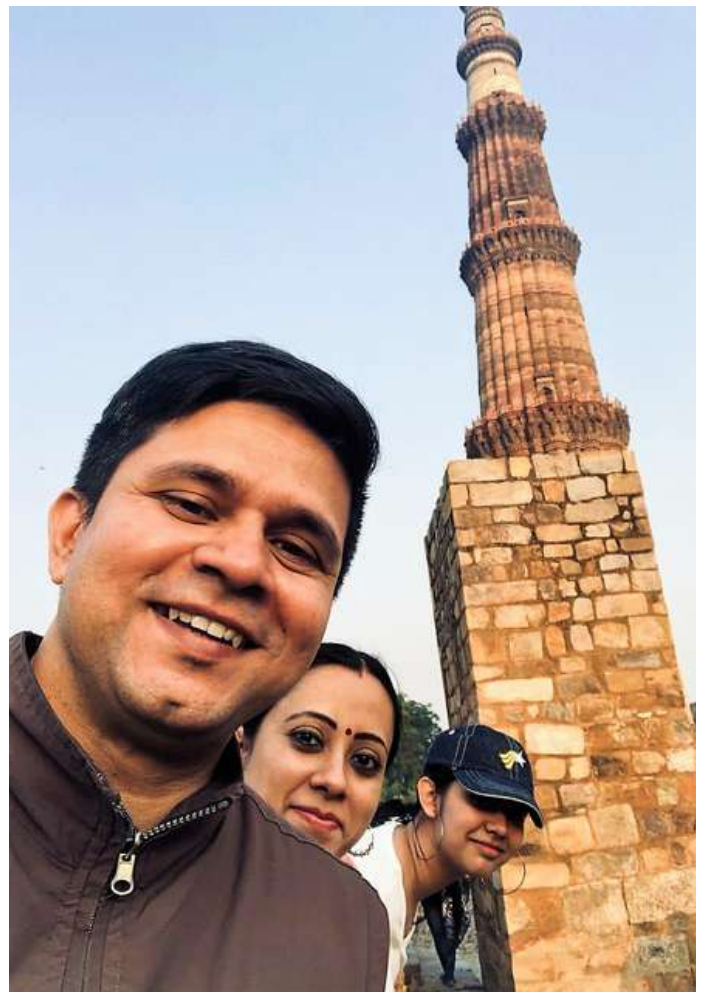
**Uday: What is your next writing project?**

**Rajat:** My next project is my book – The Failure Inc. It is a book that deals with all the prejudices and taboos we have around failures in life and how we can have a different perspective about it. As I said, it is a self-development genre.

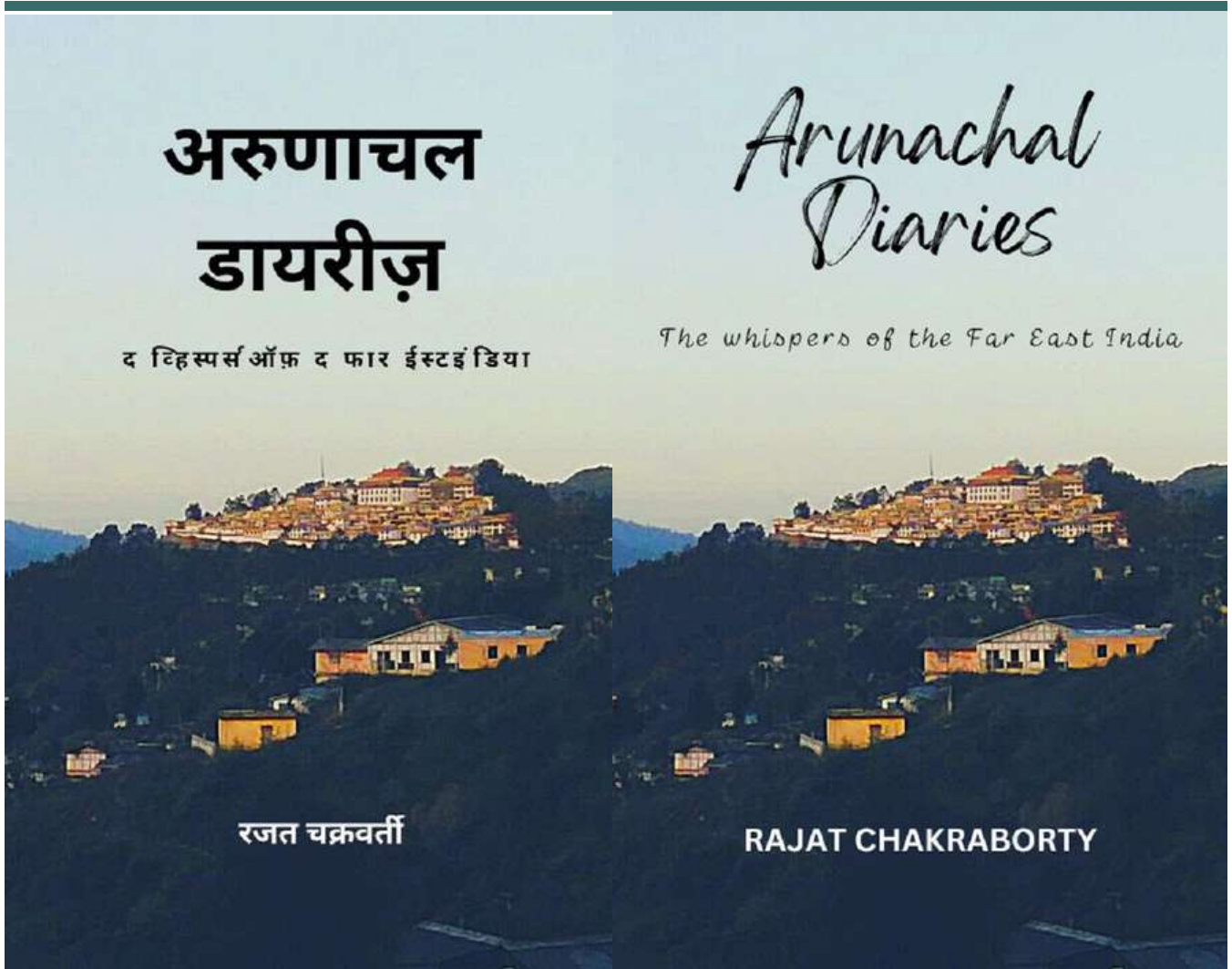

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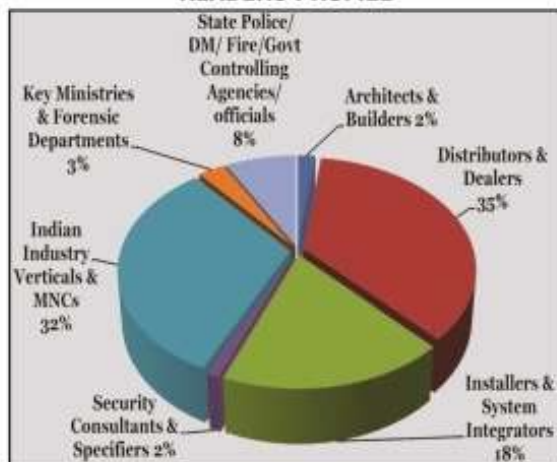

## Making A Career In Digital Forensics: A New Age Career

*Digital Forensics is an exciting new age career*

### Introduction

With increasing digitization and automation the surface area for attack for cyber criminals has increased exponentially. Cybercrime is on the rise and jobs in digital or computer forensics are in great demand. It is a branch of digital forensic science. Using technology and investigative techniques, digital forensics helps identify, collect, and store evidence from an electronic device. Digital forensics can be used by law enforcement agencies in a court of law or by businesses and individuals to recover lost or damaged data. The goal of computer forensics is to perform a structured investigation and maintain a documented chain of evidence to find out exactly what happened on a computing device and who was responsible for it. It essentially involves data recovery with legal compliance guidelines to make the information admissible in legal proceedings. The terms digital forensics and cyber forensics are often used as synonyms for computer forensics.

Digital forensics starts with the collection of information in a way that maintains its integrity. Investigators then analyze the data or system to determine if it was changed, how it was changed and who made the changes. The use of computer forensics isn't always tied to a crime. The forensic process is also used as part of data recovery processes to gather data from a crashed server, failed drive, reformatted operating system (OS) or other situation where a system has unexpectedly stopped working. Businesses also use computer forensics to track information related to a system or network compromise, which can be used to identify and prosecute cyber attackers. Businesses can also use digital forensic experts and processes to help them with data recovery in the event of a system or network failure caused by a natural or other disaster. Typically they investigate security breaches on a computer system, network, website, or database to find out how they occurred, endeavour to retrieve lost files, and repair damaged data while strengthening the security system to prevent reoccurrence.

### **Where Do They Work?**

Many computer forensic investigators work within the law enforcement industry, whether directly for law enforcement agencies or for private firms hired by agencies to manage digital evidence. It's also possible to work as a forensic analyst for a private company. In this case, you're likely to be tasked with identifying vulnerabilities, investigating breaches, and attempting to retrieve data from damaged or compromised digital storage devices. Some digital forensic investigator jobs require you to be on call to respond to incidents that might not occur during regular business hours. You can also work as a freelancer in this domain. See the profiles of typical freelancers billing in a range from \$20- \$200 per hour.

**Salary:** Digital forensic analysts in the US make an average base salary of \$74,575, according to Glassdoor, as of December 2022. Job sites ZipRecruiter and CyberSeek report salaries of \$73,271 (computer forensic investigator) and \$100,000 (cyber crime analyst), respectively.\

**Job Openings:** To get a feel of the kind of job openings take a look at indeed website for such roles.

### **Types of Digital Forensics**

There are various types of computer/ digital forensic examinations. Each deals with a specific aspect of information technology. Some of the main types include the following:

- **Database Forensics:** The examination of information contained in databases, both data and related metadata.
- **Email Forensics.** The recovery and analysis of emails and other information contained in email platforms, such as schedules and contacts.

- **Malware Forensics:** Sifting through code to identify possible malicious programs and analyzing their payload. Such programs may include Trojan horses, ransomware or various viruses.
- **Memory Forensics:** Collecting information stored in a computer's random access memory (RAM) and cache.
- **Mobile Forensics:** The examination of mobile devices to retrieve and analyze the information they contain, including contacts, incoming and outgoing text messages, pictures and video files.
- **Network Forensics:** Looking for evidence by monitoring network traffic, using tools such as a firewall or intrusion detection system.

### **How Does Computer Forensics Work?**

Forensic investigators typically follow standard procedures, which vary depending on the context of the forensic investigation, the device being investigated or the information investigators are looking for. In general, these procedures include the following three steps:

- **Data Collection:** Electronically stored information must be collected in a way that maintains its integrity. This often involves physically isolating the device under investigation to ensure it cannot be accidentally contaminated or tampered with. Examiners make a digital copy, also called a forensic image, of the device's storage media, and then they lock the original device in a safe or other secure facility to maintain its pristine condition. The investigation is conducted on the digital copy. In other cases, publicly available information may be used for forensic purposes, such as Facebook posts or public Venmo charges for purchasing illegal products or services displayed on the Vicemo website.

- **Analysis:** Investigators analyze digital copies of storage media in a sterile environment to gather the information for a case. Various tools are used to assist in this process, including Basis Technology's Autopsy for hard drive investigations and the Wireshark network protocol analyzer. A mouse jiggler is useful when examining a computer to keep it from falling asleep and losing volatile memory data that is lost when the computer goes to sleep or loses power.
- **Presentation:** The forensic investigators present their findings in a legal proceeding, where a judge or jury uses them to help determine the result of a lawsuit. In a data recovery situation, forensic investigators present what they were able to recover from a compromised system.

*Often, multiple tools are used in computer forensic investigations. A researcher at Kaspersky Lab in Asia created an open source forensics tool for remotely collecting malware evidence without compromising system integrity.*

### **Techniques Used By Forensic Investigators**

Investigators use a variety of techniques and proprietary forensic applications to examine the copy they've made of a compromised device. They search hidden folders and unallocated disk space for copies of deleted, encrypted or damaged files. Any evidence found on the digital copy is carefully documented in a finding report and verified with the original device in preparation for legal proceedings that involve discovery, depositions or actual litigation.

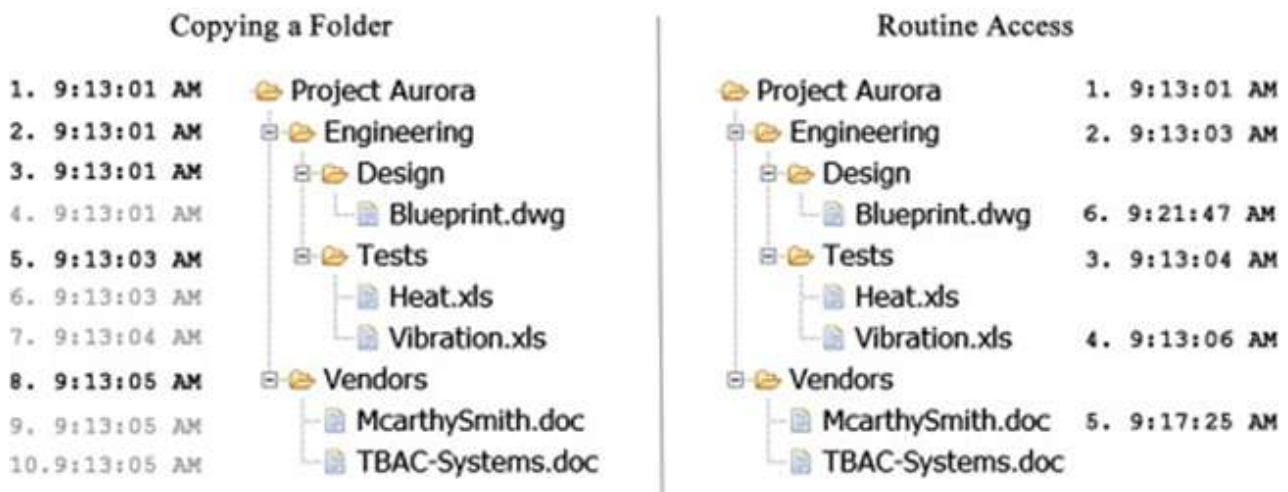
Computer forensic investigations use a combination of techniques and expert knowledge. Some common techniques include the following:

- **Reverse steganography:** Steganography is a common tactic used to hide data inside any type of digital file, message or data stream. Computer forensic experts reverse a steganography attempt by analyzing the data hashing that the file in question contains. If a cybercriminal hides important information inside an image or other digital file, it may look the same before and after to the untrained eye, but the underlying hash or string of data that represents the image will change.
- **Stochastic Forensics:** Here, investigators analyze and reconstruct digital activity without the use of digital artifacts. Artifacts are unintended alterations of data that occur from digital processes. Artifacts include clues related to a digital crime, such as changes to file attributes during data theft. Stochastic forensics is frequently used in data breach investigations where the attacker is thought to be an insider, who might not leave behind digital artifacts.
- **Cross-Drive Analysis:** This technique correlates and cross-references information found on multiple computer drives to search for, analyze and preserve information relevant to an investigation. Events that raise suspicion are compared with

information on other drives to look for similarities and provide context. This is also known as anomaly detection.

- **Live Analysis:** With this technique, a computer is analyzed from within the OS while the computer or device is running, using system tools on the computer. The analysis looks at volatile data, which is often stored in cache or RAM. Many tools used to extract volatile data require the computer in to be in a forensic lab to maintain the legitimacy of a chain of evidence.
- **Deleted File Recovery:** This technique involves searching a computer system and memory for fragments of files that were partially deleted in one place but leave traces elsewhere on the machine. This is sometimes known as file carving or data carving.

**How Digital Forensics Has Been Used as Evidence?**

Digital forensics has been used as evidence by law enforcement agencies and in criminal and civil law since the 1980s. Some high profile cases include the following

- **Google Trade Secret Theft:** Anthony Scott Levandowski, a former executive of both Uber and Google, was charged with 33 counts of trade secret theft in 2019. From 2009 to 2016, Levandowski worked in Google's self-driving car program, where he downloaded thousands of files related to the program from a password-protected corporate server. He departed from Google and created Otto, a self-driving truck company, which Uber bought in 2016, according to The New York Times. Levandowski pleaded guilty to one count of trade secrets theft and was sentenced to 18 months in prison and \$851,499 in fines and restitution.

- **Michael Jackson:** Investigators used metadata and medical documents from Michael Jackson's doctor's iPhone that showed the doctor, Conrad Murray, prescribed lethal amounts of medication to Jackson, who died in 2009.
- **Apple Trade Secret Theft:** An engineer named Xiaolang Zhang at Apple's autonomous car division announced his retirement and said he would be moving back to China to take care of his elderly mother. He told his manager he planned to work at an electronic car manufacturer in China, raising suspicion. According to a Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) affidavit, Apple's security team reviewed Zhang's activity on the company network and found, in the days prior to his resignation, he downloaded trade secrets from confidential company databases to which he had access. He was indicted by the FBI in 2018.
- **Enron:** In one of the most commonly cited accounting fraud scandals, Enron, a U.S. energy, commodities and services company, falsely reported billions of dollars in revenue before going bankrupt in 2001, causing financial harm to many employees and other people who had invested in the company. Computer forensic analysts examined terabytes of data to understand the complex fraud scheme. The scandal was a significant factor in the passing of the Sarbanes-Oxley Act of 2002, which set new accounting compliance requirements for public companies. The company declared bankruptcy in 2001.

### Career Paths in Digital Forensics

Digital forensics has become its own area of scientific expertise, with accompanying coursework and certification. Some examples of cyber forensic career paths include the following:

- **Forensic Engineer:** These professionals deal with the collection stage of the computer forensic process, gathering data and preparing it for analysis. They help determine how a device failed.
- **Forensic Accountant:** This position deals with crimes involving money laundering and other transactions made to cover up illegal activity.
- **Cybersecurity Analyst:** This position deals with analyzing data once it has been collected and drawing insights that can later be used to improve an organization's cybersecurity strategy.

### How To Build Digital Forensics Skills

Success in cybersecurity, including digital forensics, often relies on having the right technical and workplace skills for the role. For a career as a computer forensic investigator, consider investing in skills like:

- **Digital Storage Devices:** Understand how data is stored on hard drives and consumer electronic devices, so you're better equipped to retrieve critical or compromised data.
- **Operating Systems:** You'll need to know how to find and retrieve information from Windows, Linux, macOS, Unix, and Android devices.
- **Cryptography:** Often, the data you'll need to retrieve and analyze will be encrypted, so it's critical to understand encryption and decryption methods
- **Communication:** You may be tasked with documenting evidence and writing reports on your findings. In this role, you may have to communicate technical concepts to non-technical audiences, like company executives or juries.
- **Malware Engineering:** You may be tasked with reverse engineering a piece of malware to better understand its functionality and impact.
- **Digital Forensic Software:** Programs like Forensic Toolkit (FTK) contain a collection of forensic tools to help you scan devices for information and crack encryptions.
- **Data Privacy Laws:** Since you'll be working with sometimes sensitive data, you'll need to be familiar with local, federal, and international data protection laws.
- **Problem-Solving:** Rarely is the data you're looking for sitting out for you to find easily. Instead, be prepared to do some sleuthing to solve complex problems.

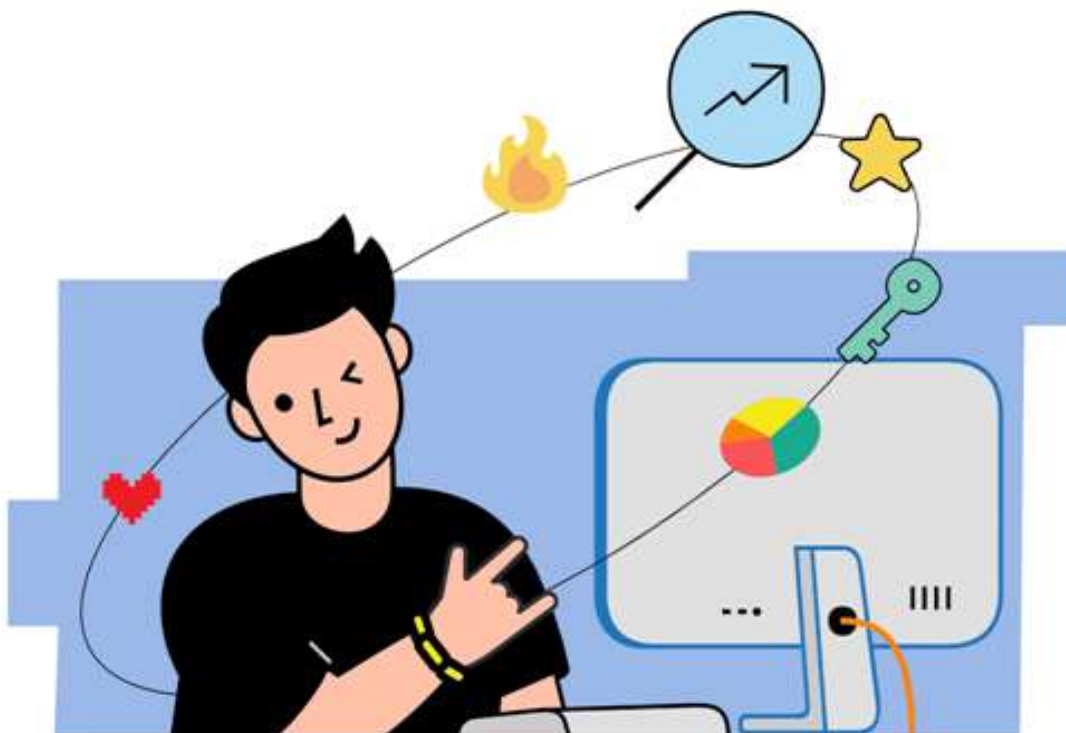

- **EnCase Certified Examiner (EnCE):** The EnCase™ Certified Examiner (EnCE) program certifies both public and private sector professionals in the use of Opentext™ EnCase™ Forensic. EnCE certification acknowledges that professionals have mastered computer investigation methodology as well as the use of EnCase software during complex computer examinations. Recognized by both the law enforcement and corporate communities as a symbol of in-depth computer forensics knowledge, EnCE certification illustrates that an investigator is a skilled computer examiner.

GCFE certification holders have the knowledge, skills, and ability to conduct typical incident investigations including e-Discovery, forensic analysis and reporting, evidence acquisition, browser forensics and tracing user and application activities on Windows systems.
- **GIAC Network Forensic Analyst (GNFA):** The GIAC Network Forensic Analyst (GNFA) certification validates a practitioner's ability to perform examinations employing network forensic artifact analysis. GNFA certification holders have demonstrated an understanding of the fundamentals of network forensics, normal and abnormal conditions for common network protocols, processes and tools used to examine device and system logs, and wireless communication and encrypted protocols.
- **Certified Information Privacy Professional (CIPP):** The IAPP offers the most encompassing, up-to-date and sought-after global training and certification program for privacy and data protection. The Certified Information Privacy Professional (CIPP) helps organizations around the world bolster compliance and risk mitigation practices, and arms practitioners with the insight needed to add more value to their businesses.

Digital forensics is a new age sunrise career. In addition, it is an exciting field to work in as no two days are likely to be the same. It also calls for a breadth of skills. ## Game Plan for Second Inning

*This article is aimed at military veterans who are contemplating early retirement (or, soon to retire on superannuation).*

While retirement is an 'event', finding gainful employment post-retirement is a process'. Like in most things military, planning for a major event starts months in advance. Therefore, the game-plan for post- retirement employment must start taking shape at least two years before the event.

- **Appreciation:** One must start be laying down the planning parameters:
  - **Skill-set Available:** Assess the skills that you are carrying forward from military to civil. For example a military pilot or computer engineer could easily find similar roles in civil, whereas an infantry officer or an artillery gunner may not be easily employable. Generic skills like HR manager, supply chain specialist, security specialist etc require civil certifications to be useful.
  - **Skill-set in Demand:** Research must be carried out via internet, networking and feedback from Veterans to ascertain the skills that are in demand in the economy.
- **Aspirations:** As a next step, one must carry out aspirations management on a weighted scale. One leaves military for various reasons, seeking to fulfill some requirements of family, children, parents, money, self-actualization and so on. This is especially so in cases of PMR/PSS. The chosen game plan must fulfill most (if not all) of those. A suggested matrix would include (but not limited to) the following:
  - 1.Place of work vis the place of residence
  - 2.Parent's health and medical requirements
  - 3.Children education and growth opportunities
  - 4.Gainful employment for spouse
  - 5.Access to infra (big city vs small towns)
  - 6.Job satisfaction
  - 7.Stature and level in organization
  - 8.Emoluments
  - 9.Free time and opportunities to engage in leisure activities.
- **Pick A Lane:** Don't scatter your effort. Decide on one or two possible lines of employment and start working on those. I have seen many Veterans waste precious time in deciding between business or job, eventually doing none.

***(Pro tip : if you don't have a business plan ready by the time you retire, its best you seek a salaried job)***

- **Business / Self-employment:** DGR offers benefits/ opportunities like COCO outlets, mining licenses, and security agency and so on. If you are considering one of these, it would be wise to interact with veterans engaged in similarly activity. Such engagement must start well before retirement and must include deep research. A detailed telephone call would not suffice; you must visit the place of business and gather feedback for yourself. Similarly, if you wish to join a family member or a friend in existing business venture, you must carry out a thorough research before jumping in.

***Pro tip : All agreements and understandings must be reduced to writing, if you decide to invest/work with a friend or family.***

- **Salaried Employment:** One could consider lateral employment offered in various other government departments. Aspirants of this option must do some research and be on lookout for such vacancies. For those opting for corporate opportunities must utilize the DGR sponsored pre-release courses in IIMs and other such similar institutions. The diploma certificate obtained in these courses doesn't count for much, however the gains in terms of networking and lateral learning are huge.
- **Sharpen the Saw:** Scan the job market for the roles that you would be interested in. Study the job -description carefully to ascertain if there are any shortfalls in your skillset. Most of the gaps can be fulfilled by short-duration online courses. In the armed forces, we acquire a lot of generic skills through our work on human resource management and material management. However, we don't receive a formal certification for the same. This deficiency can be addressed by undergoing online certification/ diploma/ degree in these domains. Such courses don't cost much in terms of time and treasure and should be completed before retirement.

*For example,* Amazon selects a large number of veterans every years. It also rejects a large number of veteran applicants each year. Your CV must reflect the QRs that the JD is looking for. One could do a Lean Six sigma online course coupled with Project management certification to add a little more weight to their CV. The job search must commence a year or two before retirement, allowing you enough time for obtaining required qualifications and certifications.

Don't be afraid of stepping out of your comfort zone and acquiring new skill sets. Most non-tech military personal are scared of Tech qualifications. They shy away from anything that has a computer involved in the process. This fear must be shed. Technical qualifications that involve computing, blockchain, data analysis, coding, cloud storage and so on are not very difficult to master. Most people with very basic tech background coupled with grasp of English language can grasp the essentials. The advances in AI and computing prowess has made these things simple to learn.

**Remember : ABCT– AnyBody Can Tech.**

- **Network through Teamwork:** You must align your efforts with other military personal in the same boat as you. Interact with other retiring candidates and exchange notes. Do it often and do it with as many as possible. You must also interact with Veterans who are currently in positions that you aspire to join. Social media has made it possible to network in a seamless manner across large distances and time zones. This advantage must be fully exploited.
- **Alphabet Soup:** I am going to suggest a few courses / certifications that can be done by retiring candidates to enhance their employment opportunities. A detailed discussion on the modalities would make the post far too long. Aspirants can find out more via a simple Google search.

In sum, devising a game plan for second inning is a time consuming process that can return handsome dividends if done carefully and diligently.
